<p><b>Dr Edward McSwiney</b></p> 	<p>Dr Edward McSwiney commenced in post as the South Regional Director of Training in January 2022. Edward also works as a General Practitioner in Co. Cork. A University College Cork (UCC) graduate, Edward completed the Cork Specialist Training Scheme in Ireland in 2015. He worked as a GP in Co. Cork and Co. Dublin before moving to Canada with his family in 2017. Between 2018 - 2021 he held formal General Practice (Family Medicine) training roles at both McMaster University and Queen's University, Ontario, Canada. He worked as a family doctor and clinical preceptor at McMaster Family Practice, a large multidisciplinary academic unit of the McMaster University Family Medicine Residency Programme, from 2018 to 2019.
